#### Executive Director's Report to the Annual General Meeting September 28, 2015

This is the 39th year of existence for BFISS. There were the two years back in 1979 and 1980 when the organization was inactive, so we have 37 years of operating as a Society. This year, I have worked for BFISS for 30 of those years. There is one person who has been here serving longer. That devoted person is Maxine Ruzicka. Maxine has served since 1977...an amazing 38 years. I cannot celebrate this day without also celebrating Maxine's enormous contribution to BFISS and to the Boundary communities.


69 people have served BFISS as Board members over the years. I congratulate each and every one of you....all 69 of you in your desire to help others. Many people only wish that they could make this a better world....you have taken action to help turn those dreams into reality.

Many hundreds of people have worked for BFISS over the years and additionally countless volunteers. Currently, at any one time, we have about 32-36 people working for BFISS with an average of about 50 people employed during the year. We are a small but significant economic contributor to the wellbeing of the area.

We each make life good, by making it meaningful. I venture to say that all of us seated in this gathering today and all of those who have contributed to BFISS, have come together because of



our desire to build more hope, more trust, more empathy and more life sustaining and hope sustaining action on behalf of others. Amazing thing...When you give of yourself to enrich the lives of others, you also enrich our own life. What could be more perfect.....when you help others, you help yourself....and there is lots of research on this. People who help others, people who engage in building greater capacity for a civic and just society are, by in large, happier and as a result, on a population health basis, healthier than others.



As an organization we are actively engaged in partnerships with other organizations that build and sustain collaborative efforts on behalf of our Boundary communities. We are all trying to survive and as organizations are competing for often scarce resources. Ironically, collaboration makes us more sustainable....it lessens the fear and engenders hope. Collaboration multi-



plies itself and provides opportunities for more.....collaboration. There are now many organizations within and outside of the Boundary that we are collaborating with in creating healthy communities. In this regard, School District #51 Boundary, Public Health Nursing and the Ministry for Children and Family Development are key and sustaining partners for BFISS and for the Boundary Communities. Additionally, local partners such as the Sunshine Valley Child Care Society, Victim's Services, the Community Alliance for Literacy, Selkirk College, FreedomQuest, the Boundary Women's Coalition and others combine efforts with BFISS to serve our citizens and communities. Regional partners such as the Circle of Indigenous Nations, Kootenay Kids, Kootenay Family Place and the West Kootenay Boundary Community Services Cooperative work collaboratively with BFISS to





Working hand in hand with our participants in 2014-2015, BFISS served 575 participants /families in one to one and family service. Of note were the high number of children/ youth served through Child and Youth Counselling services. In ad-

dition, the Baby's Best Chance program and its affiliated initiatives served a very large number of families. BFISS continues to struggle with how to accurately reflect our stats data. For some of our contracts, a family is counted as 1 service entity and for some a family where our worker is engage with several children and a parent each person is counted, as long as we are working specifically with that family member. Additionally we often work with some families who have very high needs and as such require a large number of service hours.

#### In 2014-2015, BFISS provided:

- 43 ongoing and session oriented groups that had 1855 adult attendances and 4316 child/youth attendances
- West Boundary StrongStart centres saw a total of 878 child attendances and East Boundary StrongStart centres a total of 4160 child attendances
- 37 drumming groups with 203 adult attendances and 265 child/youth attendances
- 6 community education sessions with 64 attendances
- 4 community events had approximately 204 adult attendances and 190 child attendances ...number counting at these events is difficult at best and the teams that support these events are amazing and dedicated believers in the power of prevention





Groups evaluations continue to show that groups are highly valued and provide skills acquisition and a sense of belonging for participants. The provision of groups remains an effective strategy for BFISS to manage our high number of requests for service.

As I prepare to retire from 30 years of service with BFISS, I am extremely gratified to look back over what we have all accomplished together. Our organization has grown to deeply understand the importance of working with the people that use our services as partners. We are regularly evaluating and seeking the opinions and suggestions of our staff, our participants and our partners. Soon to come, we will have our service outcomes reports posted on our website.

During our recent accreditation site visit, the accreditors affirmed that the Management and Supervisors Teams are strong and effective. In the past year, the Teams have worked hard on the restructuring of the Management team roles, preparing for accreditation, work on training issues, risk management issues, policy updates and importantly, supporting each other and our staff through the many difficult situations we all encounter in every day.
